

"Sexual Education: A Cardinal Component of Empowering Tibetan Women in Exile"

This independent study project conducted in Dharamsala, India centers on how sexual education is viewed and approached in Tibetan refugees' lives. The study utilizes gender disparity as the foundation for the argument of women's need for empowerment and reproductive rights, contextualized within the Indian and Tibetan traditions and perceptions.
